


























#### TOYS FOR KIDS

#### FIELD TRIP

Saturday September 24<sup>th</sup>! The club will have a field trip to Sindelar Fine Tool Museum <a href="http://www.sindelartoolmuseum.com/">http://www.sindelartoolmuseum.com/</a> near Edwardsburg, Michigan. (Just north of South Bend). Since we have a number of members from the Highland/Munster/Hammond area I would suggest that those from that area meet at the Highland Welcome Center on the Kennedy Expressway at 8:00 AM. They can carpool from there and take I90 to Chesterton Exit South to Indian Boundary Rd (first major intersection)

All other members wishing to attend will meet at 8:30 AM behind Speedway in K-Mart parking lot. This Speedway is South of the interstate at the first major intersection (Indian Boundary Rd) and is on the East side of Hwy 49. Members can decide who to car pool with at this location and leave those cars not making the trip. (This is a safe location). The group will travel South on Highway 49 to the Toll Road entrance and head East to South Bend. We will exit at the first South Bend exit which is US 31. We will take US 31 North to US 12 and go East on US 12 to Edwardsburg, MI. At Section St. we will turn right (South) and drive to the museum entrance. The Sindelar Museum is located at 69953 Section St., Edwardsburg, MI.

The cost, since we are going as a group, will be \$10.00/person and each person will receive a Free \$10.00 value calendar for the wall in their shop. I talked to John Sindelar and I'll finalize with him, after the Sept meeting, on the number attending, so he can arrange a private tour for our group.

# TIP: Wiping Varnish, An Easy Finish with Good Durability

Wiping varnish is a term I coined about 20 years ago to categorize (so we could understand what we were dealing with) a number of finishes that were each represented by manufacturers as unique, when in reality they were all simply oil-based varnish or polyurethane thinned about half with mineral spirits.

You can make your own, of course, or buy a commercial brand such as Wipe-On Poly, Waterlox, Seal-a-Cell, Profin or any product labeled "tung oil" that contains "petroleum distillate." (Real tung oil is labeled 100% tung oil and never contains thinner.)

Just like full strength varnish and polyurethane, wiping varnish cures hard, and it is water resistant if three or four coats are applied.

To apply wiping varnish, brush or wipe it on the wood and wipe off all or most of the excess. You can also brush and leave the wiping varnish for a faster build, but brush it out thin on vertical surfaces to avoid runs.

Allow overnight drying between coats. Before applying each additional coat, sand lightly with 320- or 400-grit sandpaper to remove dust nibs. Apply as many coats as you want to give you the look and protection you desire.

**Router Table Gauge** 



Adjusting the fence on my router table can be a bit of a guessing game. When I need to move it only a small amount, it's very easy to overshoot the mark. To gain some needed accuracy, I built a simple gauge to hold a dial indicator, as you can see in the photo.

The holder is nothing more than a piece of  $\frac{3}{4}$ "-thick hardwood with a notch cut in it. The notch allows it to be clamped to the front of the router table over the bit. Now I can easily see how much I need to move the fence for a perfect cut.
