





TIP: Freeze Candle Wax Drips to Remove

The easy way to remove candle wax that has dripped onto a finished surface is to freeze it by holding an ice cube on it for about 10 seconds. Once frozen, the wax is easy to pick off the finish without causing any damage.

If a little wax residue remains and you can't pick it off, dissolve it with mineral spirits (paint thinner) or a clear furniture polish and wipe away the residue with a cloth.

Be aware that red candle wax can stain a light finish. There's no easy way to remove this stain, but it will fade in time.

TIP: Soften Sharp Edges

It's very important that you soften all machined or hand-planed wood edges before applying any film-building finish. The finish will peel away from sharp edges (as is shown in the example) if they aren't rounded over a little.

It's also a good idea to soften edges when using non-film-building oil finishes. Sharp edges dent easier than softened edges.

You can easily remove the sharpness from edges with several light passes using medium-grit sandpaper.

TIP: Oil and Spontaneous Combustion

Drying oils, especially linseed oil, are the only finishing materials that spontaneously combust. Solvents don't spontaneously combust, paint strippers (including paint or finish residue) don't spontaneously combust, and no type of varnish spontaneously combusts. It's not totally clear whether 100% tung oil can spontaneously combust, so treat it like it does.

As linseed oil dries, it generates heat as a byproduct. If you wad up linseed-oil rags or pile them on top of each other, the heat generated in the middle can't dissipate. It builds up until it reaches the flash point of the cloth and it bursts into flame.

The easy and sure way to protect yourself if you use any product that contains linseed oil, including Danish Oil and all oil-based stains and glazes, is to hang your

rags over the edge of a trash can or similar object or spread the rags out on the floor until they dry. Once dry, you can safely throw the rags in the trash. Dried oil on rags is no different than a dried oil finish or stain on a piece of wood.

If you choose to submerge oily rags in water, then treat them as described above when you take them out. They can still spontaneously combust after the water dries out.





I like the extra light that a clip-on lamp gives when I work. The problem is there never seems to be a convenient place to attach one.

To solve this problem, I devised a holder for my shop that can be placed almost anywhere. This holder allows the lamp clip to grip securely so I can have constant and stable light at all times.


The holder is made of ³/₄" plywood. A dado in the mounting plate captures a small shelf, as you can see in the photo.

The clip part of the lamp tightly grips the shelf. A pair of dowels in the shelf fit inside the clip bends to prevent the lamp from sliding off the holder when the light position is adjusted.

Drill Press Inserts



As any drill press user knows, trying to clamp a workpiece directly to the cast iron table can be trying. The reinforcing ribs on the underside of the table can sometimes make positioning and tightening a clamp nearly impossible. After struggling with this problem for far too long, I resolved to solve it.

As you can see in the drawing, I simply cut plywood inserts to fill the spaces between the ribs and provide a flat, solid clamping surface on the underside of the table. I cut slots in the inserts to match the slots in the table so I can still make use of this option. Then the inserts are just stuck in place with silicone adhesive.

Now clamping a workpiece to the table is quick and effortless. And my only regret is not having made this modification a lot sooner.
