
VISITORS CENTER CHRISTMAS TREE





Levels of Recognition

Bronze	Requires 4 A's
Silver	Requires 2 A's and 3 B's
Gold	Requires 2 A's, 3 B's and 1 C
Platinum	Requires 2 A's, 3 B's and 2 C's
Bronze Double	Requires 8 A's
Silver Double	Requires 4 A's and 6 B's
Gold Double	Requires 4 A's, 6 B's and 2 C's
Platinum Double	Requires 4 A's, 6 B's and 4 C's
Bronze Triple	Requires 12 A's
Silver Triple	Requires 6 A's and 9 B's
Gold Triple	Requires 6 A's, 9 B's and 3 C
Platinum Triple	Requires 6 A's, 9 B's and 6 C's
Bronze 4th Level	Requires 16 A's
Silver 4th Level	Requires 8 A's and 12 B's
Gold 4th Level	Requires 8 A's, 12 B's and 4 C
Platinum 4th Level	Requires 8 A's, 12 B's and 8 C's

Levels of achievement are earned in order and lower levels must be earned before a higher level can be earned. All levels earned are retained for life.

Achievement items for each level are counted only for the level being earned. When a level is earned they are not counted for the requirements of the next level but can be repeated to meet the requirements.

TIP: Shellac and Water Rings



Shellac has a bad reputation for water marking, but it's actually impossible to water mark a shellac finish, except with very hot water, unless the shellac used for the finish is old when the shellac is applied, or the shellac on the wood has aged considerably.

As shellac in liquid form ages, it degrades and becomes more susceptible to water marking when applied to a surface. The deterioration is slow. You should probably

think of doing some tests on scrap wood if you want to use shellac that is more than a year old on a critical surface such as a tabletop. Or better, just use freshly dissolved shellac.

As with all finishes, shellac dried on wood becomes more porous as it ages, so watermarks become more likely if sweaty glasses are left in contact with the surface. Because shellac was almost the only finish used before the 1930s, it is the finish that has been water marked the most. This is the reason shellac has been saddled unfairly with a reputation for easy water marking.


The picture is of watermarks on a half-century-old lacquer finish. All old finishes are susceptible to water marking.

Pilot Hole Guide

After cutting a snug-fitting mortise for a butt hinge, you have one more challenge to face. You still have to drill the pilot holes for the screws. It sounds easy, but I often have trouble centering the pilot holes so that the hinge is held squarely in the mortise.

I decided that the best solution to the problem was to not try to drill the pilot holes “freehand.” Instead, I made a simple guide block that accurately positions the holes for me.

The drawing below shows how this works. The ½”-thick guide block is sized to match the width of the hinge mortise. Then I drill “pilot” holes in the guide block that precisely match the screw holes in the hinge. The guide block simply slips into the mortise and assumes the responsibility for positioning the drill bit.
